The GCCRI Blood, Urine and Tissue Clinical Data Bank. Established in December 1995, the bank's purpose is to identify and develop protein bio-markers that can be used as indicators or predictors of tumor activity, response to treatment, histologic subtype, or prognosis in the diagnosis and treatment of cancer in humans. IRB approval was granted by the Essex Institutional Review Board, Inc., Lebanon, New Jersey. Between December 1995 and October 2003 this research protocol, GCCRI Study #95-001, collected, processed, and stored frozen serum and urine specimens from patients with cancer and hematologic disorders undergoing evaluation and treatment at the Geffen Cancer Center and Research Institute. During this time 48, 537 serum samples (0.5 ml each) were collected from 1,437 patients. In addition, 757 urine samples (0.5 – 1.5 ml each) were collected from 484 patients. The samples are correlated with extensive patient clinical data in a proprietary database developed specifically to facilitate bio-marker research.
